POTHOLE BLITZ

Cards fall for local aces

THREE Glenorchy boxers will be in the national spotlight later this month, after securing undercard bouts on the Road to Rematch fight between Tony Mundine and Tasmanian Daniel Geale.

It's a huge break for welterweights Steven Maxwell and Paul Coppleman and cruiserweight Jeff Crosswell, who are all members of Glenorchy's Barossa Road Boxing Club.

Maxwell, Coppleman and Croswell have been training six days a week in the lead-up to the biggest bouts of their professional careers at the Launceston Silverdome on October 21.

The wettest winter in more than 50 years has played havoc with Glenorchy's roads.

GLENORCHY City Council's Works Department has recorded a 10-fold increase in the number of pot holes in roads, as compared with an average winter. Other Road Authorities across all municipalities in Tasmania are experiencing similar problems.

While the high number of pot holes is frustrating for motorists, Works Coordinator, Greg Slore, said the Council Works crews were equally frustrated as the wet weather had prevented them from quickly repairing the damaged roads.

"You can't prepare, prime and apply asphalt and bitumen materials when the roads are wet. It is like putting a bandaid on a wet finger," Greg said.

Council crews have been undertaking temporary repairs where possible during the wet and extra resources are being brought in as soon as the roads are dry to fix the pot holes as quickly as possible. Crews are starting in the northern zone of Glenorchy City and will progressively move south.

Litter traps help revive river

THE River Derwent has a cleaner future thanks to a project to install two litter traps at stormwater outlets.

A new floating litter trap has been installed at the Barossa rivulet outfall near the Derwent Entertainment Centre and another will soon be installed at Humphreys Rivulet outfall.

The project is supported by the Glenorchy City Council and the Derwent Estuary Program, through funding from the Australian Government's Caring for our Country and Community Infrastructure Program.

The Derwent Estuary Program's Stormwater Management Officer, John Chrispi-

jn, says stormwater is the main source of litter in the estuary.

passes over the ground it can pick up a range of pollutants including discarded litter," John said.

"In fact, an estimated 852 tonnes of litter is discharged to the Derwent via the stormwater system each year.

"A reduction in litter pollution discharged from Barossa and Humphrey Rivulets ensures a healthier and cleaner Derwent Estuary for future generations."

The two new litter traps are in addition 40 litter baskets operating in Glenorchy's urban stormwater drains and

"As stormwater runoff a large unit in the Prince of lution of the Derwent as they Wales which alone collects about one tonne of rubbish from stormwater flows every month.

Glenorchy City Council Stormwater Coordinator, Scott Moles, said litter traps are progressively being installed to clean up the Derwent and protect marine life.

"We know litter is a huge problem, and we are progressively addressing it by putting in more litter traps.

"The litter traps at the Barossa rivulet Humphrey's rivulet will significantly reduce litter polare urban rivulets, which pass through Glenorchy's CBD and pick up large amounts of litter," Scott said.

"The trap at the Barossa rivulet outfall has already collected more than two Cubic metres of litter in the first two months of operations."

The Derwent Estuary Program and Glenorchy City Council says everyone can help clean up the Derwent by responsibly disposing of litter and by participating in community litter campaigns including Clean Up Australia

Pool's all set for the plunge

SWIMMING at the Glenorchy Pool will be better than ever this season after a range of improvements made over the winter period.

The pool re-opens on Monday 12th October at 6.30 am.

Pool coordinator Kate Harland says infrastrucimprovements include installation of new starter blocks, pool covers and vacuum cleaner.

"The water clarity is set to improve as the new vacuum is better able to pick up small particles," Kate said.

The new blocks replace those installed in the 1960s and meet modern competition standards.

Aqua aerobics and deep water running classes introduced last year will continue with new instructors and more classes.

The pool has organised walks and bicycles available for hire.

"We will be running Learn to Swim programs and intensive programs over the Christmas School



Make your vote count

One of the great privileges of living in a democracy is the right to have a say at election time.

Shortly people will receive their Local Government election ballot papers in the

Unfortunately too many people see voting as a chore rather than the privilege it is.

At the last Local Government elections in 2007 only 52.72 per cent of people entitled to vote in Glenorchy actually returned their ballot paper and only 55.5 per cent in the previous elections in 2005.

Of the 29 Tasmanian councils, Glenorchy is at the lower end of the league table when it comes to voting in Local Government elections.

The Statewide average in 2007 was a turnout of 57.4 per cent of eligible voters but some smaller councils achieved more than 70 per cent.

This year I'd like to see Glenorchy at the top of the table!

I also encourage residents to take an active interest in finding out as much as they can about the candidates. Ask them what they stand for and whether they are prepared to work hard for the City by actively participating in all the Council meetings and the information workshops provided for Aldermen.

Find out whether sitting Aldermen seeking re-election have played an active role in their local communities and represented constituents and whether new candidates are willing to do this over the next four years.

One activity that might help people get to know the candidates better is the Candidates Forum that is being organised by Citizens for Glenorchy at the Glenorchy Civic Centre on Wednesday the 14th October 2009 between 7pm and 9pm.

As for the past two elections, all candidates standing for Mayor, Deputy Mayor or Alderman in the forthcoming elections will be invited to the forum.

candidates to be offered the option of responding to a set question, then questions will be received from the audience, and finally the candidates will be given time to pitch a 'Vote for Me' message.

The strength of Council depends on the talent and enthusiasm of the people you elect as Aldermen. Voting isn't compulsory but I encourage all eligible voters to exercise their democratic right to ensure we get the best possible team of Aldermen to run Glenorchy City Council's affairs by filling out and returning their postal ballot papers.

Water and Sewerage Bills

By now most residents will have received their water and sewerage bills from Southern Water and some are finding it an unexpected cost.

You may recall that in July, I forewarned people to also expect to receive water and sewerage bills later in the year. Being conscious of this Glenorchy City Council subtracted the cost of water from its own rates notices that went out in July and then kept the increase in general rates to a minimum.

The unusually high rainfall this year has caused havoc with the condition of our roads. We're



Run this creep out of our town

FOLLOWING a wet winter, many garden plants are set to flourish, but so are many weeds.

As spring begins, the uthern Tasmanian Southern Councils Authority is asking residents to check their garden for bridal creeper.

Bridal creeper was introduced to Australia in the 1870s and was a favourite for wedding bouquets. It is now regarded as one of the nation's worst

Property owners are required by law to control Bridal creeper on their land. Support through the Australian Government's Caring for Our Country program is currently available to landowners for the identification and removal of plants.

Pot holes can be caused by soils swelling from water inundation and breaking up bitumen. Roads that carry high volumes of traffic and heavy vehicles are also more prone to damage.

"It only takes a small hole in any seal and once the water gets in it quickly grows into a larger pot hole," Greg said.

"Once there is one pot hole, it often then leads to a cluster of them. This is because when vehicles drive over the pot hole the tyres force water back into the road surface and under the bitumen, which then causes further break down of the

"So by avoiding driving over pot holes where possible, people can reduce their spread, as well as avoiding discomfort to passengers."

Greg has appealed to the community to be patient with the road repairs as they may take some time to fix. He also asked that community members continue to report road pot holes in their areas or on roads they travel as these reports are valuable and acted on accordingly.



"We understand the problems and we are working hard to get the roads back to the quality that our ratepayers expect as soon as possible," he said.

"Weather permitting these remedial works will require five to six weeks of concerted effort by Council staff.

"Please be aware that there will be extra workers on the roads to undertake this task and drivers can help keep them safe by obeying road signs and slowing down in those zones.'

Big rains bring seepage worry

THE wettest winter in 50 years has inundated many Glenorchy properties resulting in a higher than usual number of reports of flooding and seepage problems.

While some of the problems has been caused by surface stormwater run-off, Glenorchy City Council Hydraulics Investigations Officer, David Coad, says the high rain fall has brought many aquifers to the surface.

"Glenorchy has a lot of aquifers and they fill up with a lot of rain," he said. "When the water builds up it will cause seepage by finding its way up through cracks in the ground."

David says Council can offer advice to residents about how to remedy the situation with natural run-off and seepage, but ultimately it is the individual property owner's responsibility.

"Council's jurisdiction only extends to ensuring that roofs of houses, outbuildings and large sealed areas are satisfactorily connected to Council's stormwater system.

"It is illegal to concentrate, direct or discharge stormwater onto a neighbour's property.

"However, natural stormwater run-off or seepage is a problem for individual owners to remedy."

Areas surrounded by hills such as Rosetta, Claremont, Chigwell, Springfield and Branscombe road are particularly prone to high natural stormwater run-off and seepage as gravity naturally channels the water towards them.

"An effective method to control natural stormwater run-off is to install sub-soil drainage," David said.

"Subsoil drainage pipelines are easy to install and can solve most of your drainage problems, such as damp foundations, wet lawns and muddy driveways."

Residents are required to use a registered plumber to connect the new sub-soil drain to the existing stormwater drain and contact Council for an inspection.

For seepage issues, David says drains may not be the solution due to the movement and make-up of aquifers.

"People should seek expert advice on what to do, otherwise they may waste money and time on a drain that may not be effective beyond one season," he said.

"We may not be able to fix the problem ourselves, but we may be able to provide helpful advice to resolve the issue."

"They may attend once or twice and then give up. An all male group can make men feel much more comfortable."

Paul said that the benefits of walking are well known. "It is an activity that everyone can be involved in," Paul said. "It requires no special equipment, no expensive fees and it is easy to walk and talk."

So far two local men have been trained as Heart Foundation walk organisers, including David Williams, who finds group walking boosts his motivation to exercise.

"In a group you have more incentive to go for a walk if it is prearranged and organised, and you are more likely to turn up," David said.

"Walking is probably the best low impact exercise you can do.

"Apart from the regular exercise, you also get to meet new people and make new friends."

Men on the Move walk for an hour each week, regardless of the weather, with routes varying from Glenorchy streets to local parks, reserves and other areas of Hobart.

Each person walks at their own pace and at the conclusion they stop for a cuppa and plan for the next walk.

But then it is not every day that a group of pre-schoolers have a magical visit to Government House as the special guests of the Tasmanian vice-regal couple.



It shouldn't be mission impossible

RAISING a child is not easy, in fact it can be a challenging experience at times.

That is where the Hobart City Mission can help, providing practical advice and an understanding ear to listen to concerns of parents and children.

Child and Family Worker, Jessica Latham, says parents generally want the best for their children but sometimes need a little help with effective strategies. "With parenting, it doesn't always come naturally, it is not all instinctive," Jessica says.

"Sometimes issues can seem too big or unknown, so it is helpful to have an outside person to listen, who may have some different ideas or strategies to deal with the problem."

Operating from a new location at 1 Springfield Avenue, Moonah, Hobart City Mission runs a Life Skills for Children program, which assists children and parents or guardians to develop new skills and address areas such as behavioural issues, bullying and other issues.

Life Skills for Children offers the 1-2-3 Magic program as part of its total program, which is designed for parents to address behavioural issues in children aged 2 to 12.

"1-2-3 Magic helps parents to discipline children effectively without getting into a negative pattern, like getting mad," Jessica says.



"It is really simple, largely focused on giving two warnings when unacceptable behaviour occurs and then providing a consequence, such as a short timeout.

"It takes out the excess emotion and talking from the parents."


Jessica says bullying of a child can also be an issue they can help with by providing useful strategies for the parents and child, or advocating on behalf of a child with a school.

The Hobart City Mis-

sion also offers other support and programs to help families in need.

In Glenorchy, Hobart City Mission services can be accessed at the Hobart City Mission's Springfield Ave office, and mobile emergency relief is also offered at the Goodwood Community Centre on Monday mornings from 10:00-12:30.

A fine time for a spot of exercise

OUR improved weather conditions and daylight savings often result in people walking their dogs more often and later at night.

This is great for owners and their dogs however when exercising our dogs we must ensure we are aware of any potential risks.

The importance and benefits of people regularly exercising their dogs are often overlooked. Fit dogs are generally healthier, content





and better socially, which often reduces nuisance behaviours like barking, roaming and aggression so frequently problematic to many dog owners and neighbours.

Owners also benefit by enjoying better health and additional social contact with their pet.

Ensure that you are aware of laws associated with walking your dog in public areas, such as remembering to stop and scoop your dogs poop.

There is a state law stating all owners need to properly dispose of their dog's waste at home and in a public place.

All dogs must be under the "effective control" of a person. They must be restrained by a lead no longer than two metres in length or if in an off lead area must be capable of responding to



commands i.e. coming when called.

Unless exempt, all dogs over six months of age must wear a collar and current registration disc while in any public place.

Dogs have been

proven to like a routine preferring walks at regular times. I know, it may be hard due to the weather or other commitments but try and find some time each day to exercise your pet, the

long term benefits are

reward enough.

Think of safety and health issues for your dog and other people. Never start strenuous exercise programs if your dog is not ready; let them build up their time, distance and speed gradu-

ally. This is especially important where puppies or old, overweight or out of condition dogs are concerned.

Keep an eye out for any trouble your dog may come across such as grass seeds, which can become a nasty problem in some dog's paws or ears.

Some surfaces can irritate a dog's footpads or they could sustain an injury (rocks, grasses, mud even some sands). Never let your dog eat anything they discover while walking.

All dog owners are responsible for their own pets' actions. It is critically important that you never allow your dog to bite, harass or chase another person or animal.



Clear-eyed design sights the future

INVENTOR Greg Koennecke has a vision of creating a new high-tech manufacturing industry in Glenorchy.

He and his team at Vision Instrudeveloped a proto-type for a retinal camera that takes high resolution images of the eve to screen for diseases.

Their retinal camera weighs half as much as comparable instrument, can withstand dusty, humid conditions, and can operate on a 12 volt battery.

The camera is cost effective and so easy to use that no special training is required.

The grand finalists of the 2005 $\mathrm{N}ew$ *Inventors* program are working to fill their first orders for Outback Australia, where they will be used to screen for eve. kidney and cardiovascular disease.

It's an exciting and challenging time for Greg, who worked solo on the project for four years before being joined by Chris Weimann, Ian Tait and Dirk Bertels three years ago.

The research and development has

been supported by the Centre for Eve Research Australia and the Tasmanian Department of Economic Development. However, funds have been very mous" sacrificing wages to work for equity in the company.

They are being slowed in filling orders by having to make various components by hand to save money.

"We've been hand-wiring printed circuit boards for the electronics and machining our own mechanical components," Greg said.

Greg believes the business has the potential to be highly profitable but desire to help others is a strong motivating factor.

Vision Instruments has ambitious expansion plans for the next five years, which could see an assembly plant established in Glenorchy.

The industrial skill base in the city is strong, and a Moonah business had already submitted a highly competitive quote for machining.
